



The Old Norris House in Apex

A member asked "Where was the Norris House?"

The Ellington-Norris House was built @1860 by John McC Ellington and sold around 1880 to Jessie A Norris, a turpentine and lumber businessman. It was located near the Apex Methodist Church on South Elm Street, between Chatham and Moore Streets. Mr Norris added the gothic two story front part of



the house to the simple one story farmhouse.

Maude and Maybelle Norris, whom Larry Jordan mentioned in his talk at the Halle in February, lived in this house. The sisters sold milk and eggs to the town folks through the 1950's.

The house was demolished in the 1970's as a fire drill demonstration.

In their book *Pluck, Perseverance and Paint,* the Holleman brothers, Toby and Warren, noted that the author Julia Montgomery Street lived here as a child with her aunts Maude and Maybelle Norris.*




